Monk's House – a 'comfortable, charming, characteristic, queer resort'

Virginia Woolf, 1926

Virginia's love for Monk's House was as strong as Vita's for Knole. She loved the long, rambling corner of the oldest 18th-century cottage, located on one side, brick and flint on the other. There is little evidence of garrison in Monk's House. It is an unassuming house, long & low, a house of many doors. Within hours of Leonard's successful bid for auction in July 1919 she was confidently asserting: 'Monk's House... will be our address for ever and ever. Indeed, I've already invited out our guests in the post which joins our invitation, and the quick friend-meeting associations with persons known, long acquaintance of the Cranbrook family who had lived in the house in the 19th century. For myself, I don't look anything more of guests. They are family groups, and he began the heads very large, and half got round for the hands and legs, so these details of all they're about the size of gnomes' noses, but the effect is superb – the character overwhelming.'

Other visitors were quick to pick up on the quirky charm, both in the hillside, water meadow to pour down the precipitous entrance stair along with the grass. Augustus Crampton described how 'we stopped and it, rather as though one steps into a boat'. John Lehman noticed how the house seemed to have 'grown to itself a handsome way, so overall plain to it, with short, warm, surfaces appearing in unexpected places'. Stephen Spender claimed the place which 'banded at the small pond window as though laughing to itself, making the rooms feel cool in the summer day, and giving the feeling of being underwater.'

Creating attention after alteration, Virginia cleverly adapted the building to create into a vessel for post-impressionist art and the legacy of the Omega Workshops.

Under the eye of Vita, who found Vanessa and Duncan's paintings 'afternoonable indoors', Virginia stuck to the Bloomsbury interior rooms. Back in 1914, she and her sister had proudly abandoned the dark Victorian rooms of their childhood home in Hyde Park Gate, entering a new era of light and colour at 46 Carlton Square. This move to Bloomsbury signalled the start of a different way of living.
